## **PROFESSIONAL UPDATE:**

2004 was a fulfilling year, with great travel. I (Drew Tulchin) was in Bangladesh, Dominican Republic, Afghanistan, Malaysia, the Philippines, San Francisco, Mozambique, and Denver. Afghanistan was the most incredible; I appreciated the opportunity to understand what the news doesn't begin to tell us. This rugged country has been at war for a generation. The Afghanis are a proud people who want peace. Let's hope they are successful. The Philippines is a great country. If you don't like karaoke, you will. It is impossible not to smile there, because the people are wonderful and the weather super, unless you are in rush hour traffic in Manila.

I joined Grameen Foundation USA full time in July, my largest client while consulting. This US non-profit supports growth of microfinance - banks for poor people - worldwide based on the model of the Grameen Bank in Bangladesh, lending small amounts of money to groups of women. I orchestrate projects with larger partners, organizations mostly in Asia with 50,000 + customers.

In addition, I work to increase private investment in this industry. For example, we are equity investors in a \$40 million international financing, & we will lead a few more deals in 2005. As you know, I like to be passionate about my work; Grameen is an excellent place for that. We work with 50 partner institutions in 20 countries helping more than 1,000,000 poor people, most of them women. For me, microfinance is not charity, but dignity - development that works. In most developing countries, 80% of the population is typically unbanked. Even in the US, that number is 20% or 1 in 5 Americans are unbanked. I believe it fair that all people have the same opportunities to create a reasonable life for themselves and a better life for their families.
