

Orientation to Microfinance: MFI 101

This Orientation to Microfinance is a reference sheet for easy access to learn more about this fascinating area. Industry terminology and concepts are subtle, and international development is complex, so introductory learning can be challenging. Don't be put off by jargon or seeming contradictions.

If you are working with others and new to microfinance, we recommend each person chose two websites to study. If this information is new to you, you might consider additional background in topics including international development, poverty, banking systems, and alternative financing.

Microfinance can generally be defined as providing financial services to the 'unbanked', particularly poor people working in the 'informal economy' doing work often invisible to national statistics. It is also referred to as micro-credit and mentioned as a service for micro-enterprise. It is a myth that microfinance only provides loans for people to start businesses. Product development has advanced to include savings, housing loans, credit cards, and even insurance. Typical forms are individual loans, group lending, and village banking.
